New Editors for the Newsletter

Stepping in as the new editors of the SCI Newsletter are Carter John Rice and Brad Decker. We'd like to thank Michael Torres, who recently stepped down as the lead editor, for his years of service in keeping the Newsletter moving forward and continually vibrant.

On November 17-19 of 2016, SCI hosted their Student National Conference at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana. Student composers and performers gathered from across the United States to present a total of seven concerts and one paper review session. Hosts Chad Powers and Carter Rice also offered a student conference meeting and a tour of Ball State's recording facilities.

The concerts included an impressive collection of compositional genres, including instrumental solos, vocal works, chamber and large ensemble works, and electroacoustic compositions. Some highlights from the concerts include Diogo Carvalho's *Reveal*, in which he deconstructs the sound of the guitar though seamless merging of live performance and prerecorded sounds; Bryce Fuhrman's *What I Heard*, a patient and lively duet for violin and piano; Maksym Prykhodko's *ten minutes*, a captivating electroacoustic work created entirely through live processing of audiobook segments; and *Hazel Colored Nebula* by Austin O'Rourke, a stunning work depicting the similarities between irises and nebulae for piano, percussion, and laptop. The Ball State New Music Ensemble ended the conference with Dan Smith's *Soundpainting*, a piece in which the performers reacted to a universal multi-disciplinary live composing sign language in real time.

Of course, these works were not the only standouts from the conference. Each concert displayed a repertoire of various styles and personalities, so much so that it was difficult to list only a few highlights. Although 3-4 concerts a day can easily get exhausting, it seemed as though there was something in every event to keep each attendee interested. I was particularly excited about the overall performance quality of the works. While some composers brought their own performers, Ball State musicians were gracious enough to volunteer their time to perform some of the accepted works. performers These greatly added the overall quality of the concerts. to

Overall, what truly impressed me about this Student National Conference was the hard work and the hospitality that hosts Chad Powers and Carter Rice and the Ball State volunteers offered. Throughout the conference, the hosts and volunteers worked continually and maintained an energy that made every day thoroughly enjoyable. Each event was organized and efficiently coordinated, and those running the events were gracious and friendly. For being the first Student National Conference that SCI has presented in a matter of years, the conference was surely a success.
