NEW GENERAL MANAGER

Sylvia Leinfelder was recently hired as the new General Manager of SCI. She was chosen after being interviewed, along with three other candidates, on September 27th in Manhattan. Although the other applicants were highly qualified, her skills and extensive experience particularly impressed the committee.

Ms. Leinfelder recently earned her MBA in General Management from Baruch College, City University of New York. In addition, she brings with her skills she developed while working at various music related offices. Most recently she worked as a Finance Associate at Queens Theatre in the Park. Her responsibilities included assisting in festival development and programming, grant writing, and budgeting. Previous positions include the Professional Assistant to Maestro Isaac Stern, and Assistant to the CEO and President of Columbia Artists Management Inc. where she handled projects such as tour management of classical soloists and orchestras' United States and overseas tours.

"I have a tremendous amount of respect for contemporary composers." She wrote in her application, "I would consider it an honor to facilitate or expedite the work of the Society of Composers in any way whatsoever."

We look forward to working with Ms. Leinfelder in her new position. Her leadership, professionalism, and experience will benefit SCI and its members for years to come.

If you teach in a department or school of music, please ensure that concert programs presented by your university are being collected and sent to ASCAP and BMI each on a regular basis. Each agency, which relies on these programs, extracts performance information and determines the amount of royalty credited to each composer based on a sample rate.

News from the Executive Committee

As a regular part of each newsletter I want to inform you of the various activities of the Executive Committee. As many of you know, the Executive Committee oversees many of SCI's projects. We gather at each National Conference, and every other month in New York for meetings. In addition, there is a fairly consistent dialogue within the committee on the internet.

This fall has been particularly busy for the Executive Committee. In September we were involved in the process of hiring a new General Manager for the society. After initial applications were looked over, a committee was formed to hold interviews. Reynold Weidenaar, Richard Brooks, Bruce Taub, Geoff Kidde, Martin Gonzalez, and I interviewed candidates and eventually selected Sylvia Leinfelder.


Executive Committee members continue to be busy with their own SCI projects. Richard Brooks, Producer of the CD series, relays that up to this point SCI has released sixteen CDs on the Capstone Label. He is currently preparing number seventeen for production this winter. Also, a graphic artist has recently started to design covers, which can be seen on the last two releases. Funding is still being sought to reissue the original ten LPs on CDs.

Bruce Taub, Editor of the Journal of Music Scores, reports that volumes 30 and 31 have been prepared and sent to the publisher (European American Music). Volume 30 contains works by John Allemeier, Paul Barsom, Clifton Callender, and Lionel Semiatin. Volume 31 contains works by Maria Niederberger and Steven Ricks.


New York Area Members Gather at SCI Mixer

As President Emeritus, **Greg Steinke** has been trying to make better connections with other past Presidents. He has been able to make some contacts and exchange ideas, and is working on planning activities involving them.

Thomas Wells is the manager of Composerver, a streaming-audio archive of SCI members' works available on the SCI website. He is working to expand it by including more members' works, and also by implementing an on-line distribution system to publish members' scores.

Jason Bahr is the first Student Representative on the Executive Committee. He is currently collecting suggestions and concerns from other students and will be passing this information on to the committee shortly.

Our Webmaster is **Tom Lopez**. His many tasks include responding to members' emails, maintaining the "Hot List" bulletin board, maintaining the SCI listserv, updating the SCION and Newsletter online editions, and updating conference and festival information. He recently set up an online calendar so that various administrative and committee activities could be better tracked. He is also working on setting up an online database so there are not discrepancies between the SCI office and web site.

James Paul Sain is the Student Chapter Coordinator. He reports that chapters are continually starting up around the country, and that several are in development.

The local chapters representative is **Dorothy Hindman**. She created a local chapters handbook for anyone interested in forming a chapter. She explained that local chapters support grass-roots growth and allow composers who lie outside of academia, and those who are in isolated academic situations, to have access to similar support systems as composers who

have larger programs and can put on concerts. She suggested promoting this to our newer members.

The SCION Editor is **David Drexler**. It continues to be delivered monthly to our members. Daniel Powers is now the assistant editor.

The new Newsletter Editor is **Bruce Bennett**. He has been busy putting together this inaugural issue of our online newsletter. This includes writing and editing material, collecting contributions from members, and updating the appearance of the newsletter.

Geoff Kidde is the Submissions Coordinator. He recently placed the latest call for submissions in a variety of publications, and will be organizing their judging shortly.

As Chairman of the Executive Committee, it is my job to make sure all committee members continue to maintain and improve their areas. This month I also organized and mailed out the Presidential Ballot to the National Council members. There were three candidates nominated, James Chaudoir, Greg Steinke, and Thomas Wells. Results should be posted in the next newsletter. In addition, along with Chairman Emeritus Revnold Weidenaar, I have been filling in many of the holes left by the previously vacant general manager position.

Please feel free to contact any of the Executive Committee members with questions or suggestions about their respective areas. You can also contact me and I will see that the appropriate person is contacted. We are all working very hard to deliver a large variety of services to you, and want to make sure these services continue to meet the needs of the society.

2002 SCI/ASCAP Student Composition Commission

Deadline: Dec. 1, 2001

SCI, in conjunction with ASCAP, announces the fifth in a series of annual commissions to be awarded to three student composers. The winners will be selected from a pool of finalists from each region, and their music will be subsequently premiered at the National Conference and recorded on the SCI CD Series.

Prizes:

1st place - \$1250
recording in SCI CD series score published in
SCI Journal of Music Scores
2nd place - \$750
recording in SCI CD series
3rd place - \$500
recording in SCI CD series

Application process

- •Submit both a score and a cassette tape or CD of one work for any combination of instruments, voices, and/or electronics. The work must show competency in writing for the chosen medium. Regardless of medium submitted, the subsequent commission may be limited to a particular instrumentation (to be negotiated with the host of the National Conference). The recording you submit can be of a studio session, a live performance or a sequenced format. See the map on the opposite side for your region and postmark deadline.
- All entrants must be SCI members (at any level) at the time of submission. The student rate is \$25 per year. If your institution has an SCI student chapter*, then membership dues are \$15.
- Use the official submission form on the right.
- •Composers can be of any age and nationality, but they must be either a) a student enrolled in a college or university composition degree program, or b) studying privately with a recognized professional composer but not enrolled in a degree program. Send proof by submitting either a) a copy of your current transcript that clearly indicates your degree program or b) a letter from your composition teacher confirming that you are his/her student. You must submit to the same region in which you currently study.

Adjudication

Each work will be adjudicated in one of nine regions (Region V is being divided between East and West). Three winning scores will be selected from each region and sent to the National Conference for final adjudication. Three winning composers at the national adjudication will be chosen to write new works to be performed and recorded the following year. If there is no national conference, then a regional conference host will be chosen for the performance. The judges reserve the right to reconfigure the award money. The composer may choose to have the premiere performance placed on the SCI CD, or may reserve the option to arrange his/ her own recording session. While it is our intention to include winning compositions on the SCI CD series, in all cases the direct or indirect costs of an acceptable tape for inclusion must be born by the host institution, the composer or an outside funding source. SCI reserves the right to choose the CD on which the winning works will be produced (either on the regular SCI CD series, or a special issue every other year). SCI will endeavor to arrange the performance and recordings to the mutual satisfaction of all parties, but reserves to itself final approval of the arrangements. Nevertheless, all rights to the music will remain with the composer.



MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

FULL MEMBERSHIP (\$50/YR): Eligible to submit scores to the National Conferences, regional conferences, *SCI Record Series, SCI Journal of Music Scores* and will receive the *SCI Newsletter*. Eligible to vote on Society matters and in elections for the National Council.

JOINT MEMBERSHIP (\$65/YR): Same benefits as for full members, but couple receives only one copy of the *Newsletter* and other mailings.

SENIOR MEMBERSHIP (\$25/YR): Open to those 65 years of age or older, or retired. Same benefits as full members.

ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP (\$25/YR): Open to performers and other interested professionals. Receives the *Newsletter* and can participate in the national and regional conferences.

STUDENT MEMBERSHIP (\$25/YR): Eligible to submit to regional conferences and receive the *Newsletter*.

STUDENT CHAPTER MEMBERSHIP (\$15/YR): Same benefits as student members, but open only on campuses having Student Chapters.

INSTITUTIONAL MEMBERSHIP (\$25/YR): Organizations receive the *Newsletter* and other mailings.

LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP (\$950 OR \$110/YR FOR 10 YEARS): Benefits the same as full members, for life.

AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP (\$45/YR): Open to members of music organizations that are institutional members of SCI, except libraries and archives. Same benefits as for full members.o
